





What to know about the PSAT/NMSQT

Test Date: Wed., October 11

PSAT can help you qualify you for scholarships and other honors as well as a concordant score for the Algebra 1 EOC. It can also help you start thinking about and planning for college, see which academic skills you need to work on, and get ready for the SAT.



Test length: 2 hours 15 minutes. Consists of two sections: 1-Reading and Writing and 2-Math



What to bring on test day: Pencil and/or pen, an approved calculator, water, snack



Test is now digital and will be taken on a school issued computer.



Personalized SAT practice through Khan Academy® with students' own PSAT/NMSQT scores

PSAT/NMSQT - CollegeBoard Account



How do students create a CollegeBoard account?

Create your CollegeBoard account (if you haven't already). This is the account you will use to do the following: check your PSAT/NMSQT scores, check your AP scores, register for the SAT and check SAT scores.

If you are in 10th grade or taking the PSAT/NMSQT in October and don't have a CollegeBoard account, use this link to create one ASAP: https://cbaccount.collegeboard.org/



How will students get PSAT scores?

The PSAT/NMSQT scores are typically available online through your CollegeBoard account 4-6 weeks after the test administration. Students must have a CollegeBoard account to access their scores.

 - PSAT/NMSQT Math 430 or
 - FSA/FAST Geometry EOC Level 3 or
 - CLT Quantitative Reasoning section 11
 - Grade 10 FAST ELA (level 3 or above) or
 - O ACT Reading and English average 18 or
 - SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing 480
 - CLT Verbal Reasoning and Grammar/Writing sections sum - 36
- If you earn a COC that means you did not graduate from high school and your postsecondary options are limited

- O GPA 2.0 cumulative unweighted or higher
 - 2.0 is a "C" average
 - Check HAC regularly to keep track of grades

GPA (Grade Point Average)

Credits

- 24 credits must be earned in all of the following:
 - English 1, 2, 3, and 4
 - Algebra, Geometry, and two additional math courses
 - Biology and two additional sciences
 - World History, US History, Government, and Economics
 - Fine or performing arts, speech and debate, career and technical education, or practical arts
 - O HOPE
 - 8 elective credits
 - O If you're planning to attend college, you will need two credits in the SAME world language

How to Turn in Community Service Hours

- Have the supervisor of your service provide a signed letter on the organization's letterhead describing the type of service performed, who in the community the service benefited, and a description of the service event. Student and parent/guardian should sign this letter.
- For paid work, student will need to submit a copy of their pay stub to Ms. Davis.
 Student and parent/guardian should sign this pay stub.
- Make a copy of all completed forms for your records.
- Student provides letterhead/paystub and <u>reflection log</u> to Ms. Davis with all required signatures included.
- Please allow a few weeks for hours to be updated. Students may check their hours by logging in to HAC and clicking on the registration tab.

Bright Futures Scholarship GPA



Bright Futures GPA is **NOT** the same as report card or transcript GPA.



Bright Futures **weighs** honors, AP, AICE, and dual enrollment classes **equally** with 0.5 per credit earned!



Bright Futures will also accept two additional academic electives toward the GPA calculation if it **benefits** the student.



Evaluation for Bright Futures includes an unrounded, weighted high school Grade Point Average (GPA) (calculated to two decimal places) in the 16 college-preparatory credits

- Level 3 or higher on previous FAST/FSA/EOC
- Classes taught on BHS campus
- Request during course registration process

Dual Enrollment

- 3.0 or better cumulative, unweighted GPA
- Qualifying test scores from either ACT, SAT, PERT, or PSAT/NMSQT
- Students must drive to classes at SJRSC
- Registration paperwork complete and turned in by deadline
 - All deadlines posted on Schoology & Remind

AICE Program of Choice Exceptions for Florida Graduation Requirements

- The Florida Legislature has determined the AICE Curriculum is a graduation option for students beginning with the graduating class of 2011. Students must remain AICE Students in good standing and complete all of the AICE Curriculum requirements to utilize this option. Students failing to meet the curriculum requirements are subject to all standard graduation requirements.
- AICE Curriculum Completers = Exempt from HOPE, Fine Arts, American Government,
 Economics
- If you ever exit the AICE program, you will be expected to earn credit in: HOPE, Fine Arts,
 American Government, and Economics

Requirements (how to get a high school diploma in AICE program)

Completion of the AICE curriculum includes passing seven Cambridge Advanced (AICE) courses with at least one course from each of the three AICE subject group areas (1-3), the Diploma core: Cambridge Advanced Global Perspectives and Research (AS Level) plus three additional Cambridge Advanced (AICE) courses and taking all components of the corresponding seven Cambridge Advanced (AICE) AS or A Level end-of-course exams.

AICE Program of Choice Diploma

- To be awarded an AICE Diploma, students must earn a minimum of seven points by passing a combination of examinations at either Cambridge Advanced A Level (counts for two points) or Cambridge Advanced AS Level (counts for one point), as follows.
- The AICE Diploma Core: Cambridge Advanced Global Perspectives and Research AS Level (mandatory – pass the AS Level exam) and six points from the following AICE subject group areas:

- Math & Science: Biology, Math, Physics, Chemistry, Psychology*, Environmental Management*, Physical Education, Marine Science
- Languages: English Language*, Spanish Language
- Arts & Humanities: Art & Design, Digital Media,
 English Literature I & II*, US History, International
 History*, European History, Psychology*,
 Environmental Management*, Drama, Music
- Core: AS Level Global Perspectives
- Interdisciplinary and Skills Based: Thinking Skills*, General Paper*, Global Perspectives Independent Research Report (an optional extension of AS Global Perspectives)
- Students who only complete the curriculum and take (not pass) the exams will be recognized as AICE Program Graduates.

The Cambridge AICE Diploma is awarded at Distinction, Merit or Pass level depending on the passing grades earned on the Cambridge Advanced (AICE) subject examinations. For Cambridge Advanced (AICE) exams, the passing letter grades range from A* (at A Level only) to E with A* being the highest. The lowest passing grade of E is comparable to a U.S. course grade of C or a 3 on an AP® examination. Students who do not qualify for a Cambridge AICE Diploma will receive AS or A Level General Certificate of Education (GCE) subject certificates for the subject examinations passed. Students who complete the Cambridge AICE curriculum will be provided with the best possible foundation for advanced postsecondary studies anywhere in the world.

Other ways to qualify

Students who have demonstrated academic merit through a recognition program may be eligible for Bright Futures without having to meet one or more of the requirements. Note: Both AICE and IB Diplomas must be earned prior to high school graduation. Confirmations may come from AICE and IB as late as September. Please refer to the table below for how to qualify based on one of the merit recognition programs.

State University System Credit Requirements

Admission into Florida's public universities is competitive. Acceptance is based on enrollment limitations and qualifications of the freshmen applicant pool. Prospective students should apply to more than one university and complete a rigorous curriculum in high school to increase their chances for acceptance.

- Minimum credits for admission to a state university in Florida:
 - 4 English/Language Arts
 - 4 Mathematics (at or above the Algebra 1 level)
 - 3 Natural Sciences (two of which must have included substantial lab requirements)
 - 3 Social Science (to include anthropology, history, civics, political science, economics, psychology, and/or geography)
 - 2 World Language
 - 2 additional academic credits


