



GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS



ASSESSMENTS

Must pass two assessments to graduate with diploma (otherwise you earn a Certificate Of Completion)

- Algebra 1 EOC (level 3 or above) or
 - ACT Math 16 or
 - SAT Math 420 or
 - PSAT/NMSQT Math 430 or
 - FSA Geometry EOC Level 3 or
 - CLT Quantitative Reasoning section 11
- Grade 10 ELA FAST or
 - ACT Reading and English average 18 or
 - SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing 480 or
 - CLT Verbal Reasoning and Grammar/Writing sections sum 36

If you earn a COC that means you did not graduate from high school and your post-secondary options are limited

GPA

GPA - 2.0 cumulative <u>unweighted</u> or higher


- 2.0 is a "C" average
- Check HAC regularly to keep track of grades

CREDITS

24 credits must be earned in all the following:

- English 1, 2, 3, and 4
- Algebra, Geometry, and two additional math courses
- Biology and two additional sciences
- World History, US History, Government, and Economics
- Fine and Performing Arts, Speech and Debate, Career and Technical Education, or Practical Arts
- HOPE
- 8 elective credits (to include .5 credit of personal financial literacy - only for ninth grade entry year of 2023-2024 and beyond)
 - If you're planning to attend college, you will need two credits in the SAME world language



COMMUNITY SERVICE/PAID WORK HOURS

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT SJCSD GPA:

- GPA's update after every semester:
 - In January, after semester 1 grades post
 - In the summer, after semester 2 grades post
- Each letter grade has a quality point value assigned
- AP, AICE, Dual Enrollment, pre-AICE, and honors counts towards your weighted GPA
 - Honors and pre-AICE = additional .50 quality point
 - AP, AICE, DE = additional 1.0 quality point
- Only cumulative, unweighted GPA counts towards graduation and qualifications for Dual Enrollment



As a high school student, your student is an <u>ADVOCATE</u> for their education and learning. Encourage them to

- Communicate with their teachers


WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID ?

Financial aid is ANY Resource that can help you pay for college.

- Grants (you don't have to pay back)
- Scholarships (you don't have to pay back)
- Work-Study (you don't have to pay back)
- Loans (you DO have to pay back)

You can use financial aid to help pay for:

- Tuition
- Books
- Room & Board
- Supplies
- Transportation



THERE ARE FOUR WAYS TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID

FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

Who should apply?

EVERYONE who wants to go to any type of school after high school

When should you apply?

 December of your senior year AND every year after that while enrolled in college (check with your college for specific deadlines)

What does this application cover?

 Grants, Federal Guaranteed Student Loans, and Work-Study provided by the Federal Government

What do you need?

Tax forms/records, social security number, and W-2 forms

How do you apply?

FLORIDA FINANCIAL AID

Who should apply?

EVERYONE

When should you apply?

Application opens October 1 of senior year

What does this application cover?

INSTITUTION AL FINANCIAL AID

Who should apply?

 Talk to the college/university financial aid office to determine what programs you will qualify for

When should you apply?

 Contact college/university as every school has different deadlines

What does this application cover?

Grants and Scholarships provided by the University or College

What do you need?

 Usually, the FAFSA has to be filled out first but contact the college/university to find out more information

How do you apply?

 College and Universities generally have a separate application process for financial aid

PRIVATE SCHOLARSHIP c

Who should apply? EVERYONE

When should you apply? Now and continue searching for scholarships even when you're in college

What do you need? Academic history/transcript, letter(s) of recommendation (if required), essay(s), resume of activities, ACT/SAT/CLT scores, scholarship application and deadlines



Start searching for scholarships early and continue searching throughout college.

Apply to EVERY scholarship for which you are eligible.

Essays can be reused and tailored for each new application.

Review your social media accounts and remove inappropriate material.

GET ORGANIZED!

Make a list of deadlines and don't miss them.

Keep a folder/file/binder with everything that is needed to apply for multiple scholarships.

- ACT/SAT/PERT scores
- High school transcript
- Letters of recommendation (because you may be able to use one for multiple scholarships)
- Resume of activities, community service, and leadership roles
- Essays (because you may be able to use one essay for multiple scholarships)

Create a new email account solely for college information and make sure you have an appropriate email address.

- BigDaddy01@gmail.com (NO)

BEWARE OF SCAMS!



NEVER pay for scholarships or searches.

Scholarships are never "guaranteed".

Feel too good to be true? It probably is! Do more research and ask around.

Trust your instincts.

Scholarships are gifts; they never have to be repaid.

Never give out bank account, credit card, or social security information.



FLORIDA ACADEMIC SCHOLARS (FAS) AND FLORIDA MEDALLION SCHOLARS (FMS) AWARD REQUIREMENTS



 Bright Futures GPA is NOT the same as report card or transcript GPA.

Bright Futures weighs honors, AP, AICE, and dual enrollment classes equally with 0.5 per credit earned!

Bright Futures will also accept two additional academic electives toward the GPA calculation if it **benefits** the student.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMS (ACT/SAT/CLT)

Tests taken through August 31 of high school graduation year are accepted for evaluation purposes.

Students will be evaluated based on official test scores from the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) repository. To ensure OSFA obtains official test scores:

Ensure demographics on test registration and high school transcript match; and

Request official single-sitting test scores (not superscore) be sent to one of Florida's 12 state universities, when registering for the ACT/SAT/CLT, even if the student plans to attend an institution which is not a state university.

SERVICE/WORK HOURS

Students are responsible for submitting documentation of paid work hours or service hours.

Students are allowed to combine paid work hours and community service hours to count towards the requirement for the Bright Futures Scholarship.

12th Grade – October 21-22

WHAT SHOULD STUDENTS DO *Now* to Qualify for a bright Futures scholarship?

11TH GRADE

Keep up with course work and maintain a good GPA.

Check service/work hours in HAC. You should have at least 100 hours by now.

Submit service/work hours to Ms. Davis in 2nd floor School Counseling office

Schedule meetings with college representatives and ask questions about financial aid and Bright Futures.

Begin planning for next year's courses with college and Bright Futures in mind.

Take SAT or ACT and send scores to a Florida public university.

WHAT SHOULD STUDENTS DO *Now* to Qualify for a bright Futures scholarship?

12TH GRADE

Review your Bright Futures Report.

See your school counselor if there are any errors on your transcript.

Take note of what is "Missing" to qualify for each award.

Take steps to improve your Bright Futures GPA if it is borderline.

Submit any remaining service hours by winter break.

Take or re-take SAT, ACT, or CLT and report your scores to a Florida public university.

WHAT SHOULD STUDENTS DO *NOW* TO QUALIFY FOR A BRIGHT FUTURES SCHOLARSHIP?

12TH GRADE

REGISTER/APPLY! REGISTER/APPLY ON OCTOBER 1ST! DO NOT WAIT TO REGISTER/APPLY!

Students do not have to be eligible for Bright Futures to register/apply. You can register/apply now and become eligible by graduation.

You will NOT be eligible if you do not REGISTER/APPLY!

EVALUATION PERIODS

There are two evaluation periods:

- Early Evaluation
- Final Evaluation

Transcripts will automatically be submitted by SJCSD within 30 days of the end of each semester

EARLY EVALUATION

Students cannot lose an award based on early evaluation unless they fail to earn a standard Florida high school diploma from a Florida public or FDOE-registered private high school.

Early Evaluation is based on:

Required coursework and GPA through 7th semester (1st semester of senior year)

Coursework in progress for 8th semester (2nd semester of senior year)

Service hours earned and turned in by December 20

Test scores for tests taken through January 31

FINAL EVALUATION

Final Evaluation is based on:

All required coursework and GPA completed by high school graduation

Service hours completed by a high school graduation

Test scores for all tests taken through August 31 of high school graduation year

High school graduation date associated with earning a standard high school diploma

ELIGIBILITY NOTIFICATIONS — SENIOR YEAR

Upon creation of a Student Account, students will receive a User Name and Password.

Students must check their online account for award notices – students are responsible for keeping their demographic information updated and tracking their application and award status.

OSFA will post official award eligibility or ineligibility determinations to student online accounts.

Students awarded IB or AICE Diplomas will receive notifications of eligibility determination in early fall after a list of AICE and IB Diploma recipients has been received. These students must have filled out a FFAA prior to August 31 to receive the award.
