Important Tasks for 12th Grade

Visit	Visit post-secondary campuses
Finalize	Finalize resume of activities
Apply	Apply to University/College/Vocational School
Apply	Apply for financial aid <ul style="list-style-type: none">• FAFSA (Federal Application for Student Aid) – December 1• FFAA (Florida Financial Aid Application, including Bright Futures Scholarship) – October 1
Apply	Apply for scholarships
Request	In May, request a final transcript to be sent to the post-secondary institution that student is attending

Important Tasks for 12th Grade

1

Review transcripts in HAC and check for errors

2

Meet with school counselor to go over graduation requirements (this will automatically be scheduled at the beginning of the school year)

3

Retake any courses on transcript with D or F to improve GPA and/or get back on track to earn credits for graduation (should be done before 25-26 SY begins)

4

Take ACT and/or SAT again if graduation assessments have not yet been met and/or if higher score is needed for Bright Futures scholarship

Important Tasks for 11th Grade

Review

- Review transcripts in HAC and check for errors

Attend

- Attend college fairs and speak with college/career reps when they are on the Beachside campus

Visit

- Visit post-secondary schools

Research

- Research post-secondary institutions and programs of study to aid in senior year course selections

Keep

- Keep updating Raise.Me account with final semester grades and activities. Apply to any other scholarships that students qualify for.

Important Tasks for 11th Grade

Take

- If interested in the military, take the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB)

Register

- Register and take the ACT and SAT
 - Be sure to send scores to at least one University in Florida for Bright Futures purposes

Register and pay

- Register and pay for PSAT/NMSQT if student wants to possibly qualify for National Merit Scholarship

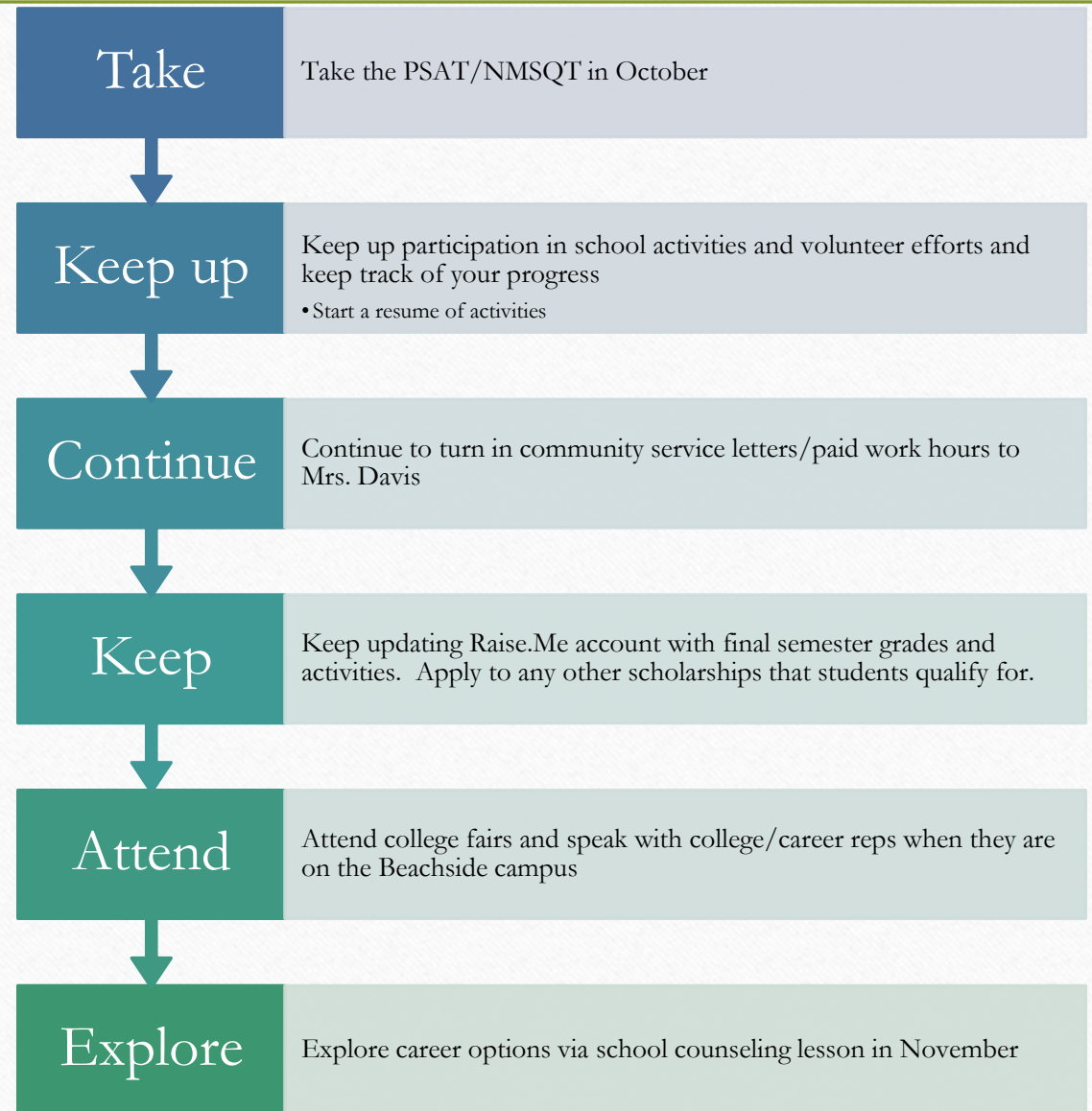
Link

- Link CollegeBoard and Khan account to receive personalized practice based on 10th grade PSAT/NMSQT results

Keep up

- Keep updating resume of activities with participation in school activities and volunteer efforts

Reduced schedule/ Executive Intern (CO-OP)?

Reduced – 12th graders can reduce up to 3 periods during their senior year if the student **is on track** for an on time high school graduation.

- **Student should provide their own transportation.**
- Morning or afternoon reduced periods cannot be guaranteed.
- Students cannot 'hang out' at school during a reduced period.

Blended – Blend of classes at both Beachside HS and dual enrollment at either SJRSC or FCTC.

- **Student should provide their own transportation.**
- Seniors can choose to take all their classes with SJRSC (must take at least 12 credit hours per term)

Executive Intern (CO-OP) – Students can have up to 4 executive intern periods cumulative during 11th and 12th grade and will be allowed to leave campus early.

- **Students should provide their own transportation**
- Students should work 25 hours a month for every period on their schedule.
- Assignments and pay stubs will be turned in to earn a grade in the course.
- This is a credit bearing class and will count towards one of the 4 periods students should take senior year.
- Students cannot 'hang out' at school during an executive intern period.

SJRSC Dual Enrollment – Things to Consider

- Parents have no access to student's dual enrollment grades until they are added to both the college and high school transcript
- College professors/academic advisors will not communicate with parents
- All high school students who are taking dual enrollment classes are treated as an adult college student and will be taking classes with adult college students
- High school counselors cannot advise on AA degree requirements or pre-requisites needed for intended majors. Students should contact SJRSC for degree requirements
- **Students should be extremely intentional when choosing dual enrollment courses to be sure they are getting pre-requisite credits needed for their college major. Students should research courses needed to complete their Bachelors degree at their intended university, then work backwards from there when choosing dual enrollment courses.**
- Beachside schedule cannot be modified or changed to accommodate dual enrollment classes
- College professors do not allow students to 'remediate' or 'retest'.

SJRSC Dual Enrollment – Meeting with Counselor

- Student should tell counselor their intention to take dual enrollment at meeting. Them telling us their intention in no way enrolls them in a dual enrollment course. The student will be directed to the BHS dual enrollment website: <https://www-bhs.stjohns.k12.fl.us/guidance/dual-enrollment-sjrsc/>
- Counselor will not remove any courses from schedule until SJRSC gives us notification that the student is enrolled in courses
- Student should pay attention to Schoology posts and Remind text messages, so they don't miss dual enrollment deadline
- SJRSC and BHS Classes
 - Traditional dual enrollment students may take a maximum of ten (10) credit hours in the fall term, ten (10) credit hours in the spring term, and six (6) to eight (8) credit hours (a maximum of 2 courses total) for the summer term



PARKING SPOTS ARE NOT GUARANTEED!!

Students are responsible for providing their own transportation **even if they don't get a parking space** if the schedule includes leaving early or coming in late (because of executive intern or blended with dual enrollment).

Students are not allowed to 'hang out' on campus if they are not scheduled in a class or during their executive intern (CO-OP) period.

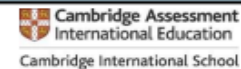
