






What to know about the PSAT/NMSQT

Test Date: Wed., October 22

PSAT can help you qualify you for scholarships and other honors as well as a **concordant score for the Algebra 1 EOC**. It can also help you start thinking about and planning for college, see which academic skills you need to work on, and get ready for the SAT.



Test length: It should take you just over 2 hours to complete, not including breaks.



What to bring on test day: Pencil and/or pen, an approved calculator, water, snack



Test is digital and will be taken on a school issued computer. Most of the questions are multiple choice, though some math questions ask you to write-in the answer rather than select it.



You can move back and forth between questions in a module and review your answers until time expires.



You can mark for review any questions you want to come back to later.

PSAT/NMSQT - CollegeBoard Account

How do students create a CollegeBoard account?

- Create your CollegeBoard account (if you haven't already). This is the account you will use to do the following: check your PSAT/NMSQT scores, check your AP scores, register for the SAT and check SAT scores.

How will students get PSAT scores?

 The PSAT/NMSQT scores are typically available online through your
 CollegeBoard account 4-6 weeks after the test administration. Students must have a CollegeBoard account to access their scores. Assessments (Algebra 1 EOC and Grade 10 ELA FAST)

 - O Algebra 1 EOC (level 3 or above) or
 - O ACT Math 16 or

 - FSA/FAST Geometry EOC Level 3 or
 - CLT Quantitative Reasoning section 14
 - O Grade 10 FAST ELA (level 3 or above) or
 - O ACT Reading and English average 18 or
 - SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing 490
 - CLT Verbal Reasoning and Grammar/Writing sections sum - 39

- O GPA 2.0 cumulative unweighted or higher
 - 2.0 is a "C" average
 - Check HAC regularly to keep track of grades

GPA (Grade Point Average)

Credits

- 24 credits must be earned in all of the following:
 - English 1, 2, 3, and 4
 - Algebra, Geometry, and two additional math courses
 - Biology and two additional sciences
 - World History, US History, Government, and Economics
 - Fine or performing arts, speech and debate, career and technical education, or practical arts
 - O HOPE
 - 8 elective credits, including .50 credit in financial literacy
 - O If you're planning to attend college, you will need two credits in the SAME world language

**AICE Students do not have to take HOPE, Gov/Econ, Financial Lit or Art

Community Service



Not needed for graduation



Needed for \$\$ (scholarships, including Bright Futures)



Your goal should be to finish **100** hours of community service (or work) by the end of **11th** grade so you will qualify for the highest level of the BF scholarship

How to Turn in Community Service/Work Hours

- Have the supervisor of your service provide a signed letter on the organization's letterhead describing the type of service performed, who in the community the service benefited, and a description of the service event. Student and parent/guardian should sign this letter.
- For paid work, student will need to submit a copy of their pay stub to Ms. Davis.
 Student and parent/guardian should sign this pay stub.
- Make a copy of all completed forms for your records.
- Student provides letterhead/paystub and reflection log to Ms. Davis in the front office with all required signatures included.
- Please allow a few weeks for hours to be updated. Students may check their hours by logging in to HAC and clicking on the registration tab.

These requirements are subject to change each legislative season

*Students who earn the AICE Diploma Award do not have to meet the GPA or Testing requirements. They DO have to submit the Volunteer/Work hours.

Bright Futures Scholarship GPA



Bright Futures GPA is **NOT** the same as report card or transcript GPA.



Bright Futures **weighs** honors, AP, AICE, and dual enrollment classes **equally** with 0.5 per credit earned!



Bright Futures will also accept two additional academic electives toward the GPA calculation if it **benefits** the student.



Evaluation for Bright Futures includes an unrounded, weighted high school Grade Point Average (GPA) (calculated to two decimal places) in the 16 college-preparatory credits

When do you get your Bright Futures evaluation?

- 10th graders In April
 - O Posts will go out via Schoology for 10th graders to pick up their evaluation from their school counselor
- 11th graders In April
 - Evaluations will be given via English class during a classroom lesson about the college application process
- 12th graders In October and April
 - O Evaluations will be given via English class during a classroom lesson about financial aid in October
 - Posts will go out via Schoology for 12th graders to pick up their evaluation from their school counselor in April

What should you do now to get ready for college?



Keep up with course work and maintain a good high school GPA – especially in CORE classes (English, Math, Science, Social Studies, World Language)



Stay involved in school and community. Seek out community service opportunities



Turn in service hours/work hours to Ms. Davis in the front office



Begin planning for next year's courses with your post-secondary plans and Bright Futures requirements in mind

- Registration paperwork complete and turned in by deadline
 - All deadlines posted on Schoology & Remind

AICE Curriculum vs. AICE Diploma Award

- AICE Curriculum Core
 - Must COMPLETE at least 7 AICE level classes with at least 1 in each category
 - O Complete means FINISH the class and SIT for the exam
 - O BHS students must also take most of the other graduation requirements, tests and earn the required GPA
 - Equivalent to a High School Diploma
- AICE Diploma Award
 - Must TAKE and PASS at least 7 AICE exams with at least 1 in each category
 - Earning the Award means 100% Bright Futures


