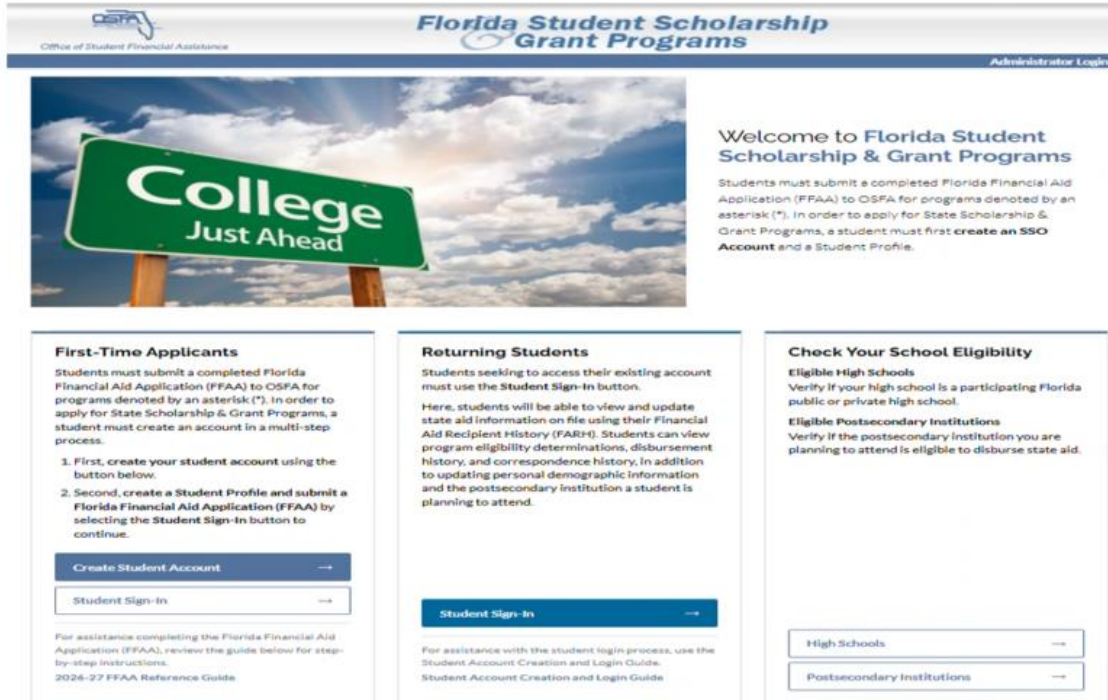

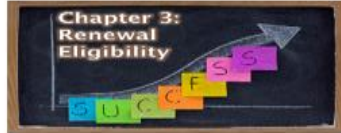

Qualifying Test Scores:

- Students must meet exam scores for either the ACT[®], CLT[®], or SAT[®].
 - FAS – Scores are set at the 89th percentile
 - FMS – Scores are set at the 75th percentile
- Students will be evaluated based on the official test score received from the Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) Test Repository.

Qualifying Test Scores:

- Students should:
 - At the time of each test registration, send scores from single test sittings (not superscore) to a Florida **public university** or Florida public state college.
 - Ensure demographic information and their current address is accurate on each ACT[®], CLT[®], or SAT[®] test registration.
 - This demographic information must match the demographic information found on the student's high school transcript.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

Qualifying Test Scores:

- Testing Dates/Deadlines:
 - Test scores from exams taken no later than August 31 of the student's graduation year will be accepted.
 - Mid-Year Graduates (test scores from exams taken no later than January 31 for mid-year graduates)
- Students who are seeking postsecondary funding immediately in the Spring 2027.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

Qualifying Test Scores:

The ACT[®] Science section is optional for Bright Futures. The ACT[®] composite score will be calculated using the following policies:

- Students that have never taken the Science section will have three sections (English, Math, Reading) added together and divided by three.
- Students that have ACT scores with Science reported will have two averages calculated (with and without Science), which will consist of:
 - Four sections (English, Math, Reading, Science) added together and divided by four, and
 - Three sections (English, Math, Reading) added together and divided by three.
- **Note:** The higher average of these two composite scores will be used for Bright Futures evaluation purposes.

VERY IMPORTANT – Students will be evaluated for Bright Futures based on official test scores from the FDOE repository. To ensure Office of Student Financial Assistance obtains official test scores: Ensure demographics on your test registration and high school transcript match; and request your official test scores be sent to one of Florida’s 12 state universities when registering for the ACT and/or SAT.

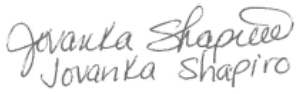

- **3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses;**
- **3 full Career and Technical Education credits;** (*On-the-job training may not be substituted for any of the three required career credits*)
- **3.5 unweighted GPA in the Career and Technical Education credits;**
- **Achieve the required minimum score on the ACT[®], SAT[®] or PERT exams** (see table); and
- **30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or the combination of both for 100 total hours.**

o Note: 75 hours of volunteer service hours will be required for students entering grade 9 in the 2024-2025 school year and thereafter.

Coursework Requirements:

- **Gold Seal Vocational (GSV) Scholarship**
 - Aligns with the Standard High School Diploma requirements; excluding electives.
 - Take any 3 full Career and Technical Education credits; On-the-job training may not be substituted for any of the three required career credits.

- **Gold Seal CAPE (GSC) Scholarship**
 - Requires a minimum of five postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit.

Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV)

GSV Scholars awards may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer:

- Applied Technology Diploma
- Technical Degree Education Program (associate in applied science or associate in science)
- Career Education Certificate Program

- **You will NOT be eligible if you do not APPLY!**

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA):

- A 2027-2028 FFAA is required to be submitted for students who wish to be evaluated for a scholarship.
- Must submit a completed FFAA during the last year in high school, beginning October 1, 2026, and no later than August 31, 2027.
- If an FFAA is not completed, a student will forfeit their eligibility for a Bright Futures Scholarship.
- Encourage all high school seniors to apply, even if they are:
 - Planning to attend out-of-state institutions,
 - Enlisting in the military, or
 - Planning to engage in a service or religious obligation.

- Coursework in progress for 8th semester
- Volunteer Service, or Paid Work hours earned through January 31
- Test scores for tests taken through January 31

Final Evaluation

Final Evaluation is based on:

- All required coursework and GPA completed by high school graduation
- Volunteer service/paid work hours completed by graduation.
- Test scores for all tests taken through August 31 of high school graduation year
- High school graduation date associated with earning a standard high school diploma

Eligibility Notification

- Upon creation of a Student Account, students will receive a User Name and Password.
- Students must check their online account for award notices – students are responsible for keeping their demographic information updated and tracking their application and award status.
- *OSFA will post official award eligibility or ineligibility determinations to student online accounts.*
- Students awarded AICE or IB Diplomas will receive notifications of eligibility determination in early fall after the list of AICE and IB Diploma recipients has been received. These students must have filled out the FFAA no later than August 31 to receive the award.

Award Amounts

- FAS scholars attending a public institution will receive an award to cover 100% of tuition (NOT room and board) and specific fees.
- FMS scholars attending a public institution will receive an award to cover 75% of tuition (NOT room and board) and specific fees.
 - FMS students attending a Florida College System institution (28 State/Community Colleges) who enroll in an associate degree program will receive an award to cover 100% of tuition and specific fees.

- FAS and FMS students attending a nonpublic institution will receive a comparable amount as noted in the Private Award Chart accessible through the Bright Futures Student Handbook, Chapter 2, page 4
